

## FEEM AT COP28

## 30 November – 12 December

Fondazione Eni Enrico Mattei (FEEM) will participate in the 28th UNFCCC Climate Conference (COP), to be held in Dubai from November 30th to December 12th.

COP28 will be **an important event** for several reasons, not least because it marks the conclusion of the first global inventory (GST), the main mechanism through which progress under the Paris Agreement is assessed. Alongside this, the start-up and functioning of the Loss and Damage Fund (established at COP27), agreement on a development framework for the global adaptation goals decided during the Paris Agreement (GGA), energy transition, transformation of food systems, and climate finance will be focal topics. With over 70,000 participants expected, COP28 will be a meeting point for thousands of experts, stakeholders, political personalities, and negotiators, who will discuss the most important topics related to climate change.

Against this backdrop, **FEEM**, as a non-profit foundation in the field of economic, environmental and energy research, will attend the COP to **offer a compass for understanding the many issues at stake**. Alongside daily coverage for Equilibri Magazine, the Foundation's sustainable development magazine, FEEM accredited media researchers will follow the work of the Conference and produce in-depth coverage of the topics at the heart of the debate on a daily basis.

The **planned outputs** will be a series of articles for various national and international newspapers, and in-depth videos. The **articles** will examine the issues addressed, the results of the negotiations, and their significance in the context of the energy and environmental transition scenario. The **in-depth videos**, on the other hand, will be produced **in different formats** (for social networks, YouTube and print media outlets), and will be structured by alternating in-depth analysis of the topic with interviews with experts from the world of science and policy.

The topics covered will follow the thematic days of the COP and will include:

- an introduction to the COP, its role and objectives;
- health in relation to climate change;
- the link between sustainable development and peace;
- sustainable finance;
- a just transition, in terms of gender equality and social equity;
- the prospects for the energy industry and the possibilities offered by new technologies;
- the role of climate action at local level;
- the future of transport;
- education and skills for the green transition;
- land use:
- the nexus between food, agriculture and water;
- a final reflection on the results of the negotiations.
